# UWL's Sustainability Business Specialist Apprenticeship Among Six Who Are Given Gold-Standard Royal Seal of Approval

To celebrate the coronation of His Majesty King Charles III, industry experts recently chose six green apprenticeships - including one from the University of West London - to be marked with the Coronation Emblem.

ducation is a key tool in the fight against climate change.
As the UK works towards a sustainable future, it is important that its workforce has the necessary skills. Selected because of their contribution to a low carbon economy, and ability to develop these skills, the courses underline the King's well-known commitment to sustainability and environmental causes.

The UWL Sustainability Business Specialist level 7 apprenticeship is one of two business-focused options. The remaining four apprenticeships focus on conservation and forestry skills, along with low-carbon heating technician and electrician roles.

The Sustainability Business Specialist apprenticeship is an integrated degree, meaning that those undertaking it will be qualified with a master's in sustainable business on completion. The course is aimed at supporting people who are working in the field or keen to do so in developing their knowledge and behaviours to progress their careers while implementing sustainable business practices and

managing the introduction of innovative green solutions.

The Sustainability Business Specialist qualification is very much at the forefront of the Local Skills Improvement Plan (LSIP) for West London, says Janet Rowson, who is Director of Apprenticeships at UWL, UK.

"We are delighted to be launching an apprenticeship that has been recognised by His Majesty to receive the King's Coronation Emblem. Apprenticeships are a very important part of the overall UWL provision of career-focused education and training, and we are keen to support sustainable career paths for a greener future,"

she said.





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# Scholastic View on Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Integration into Cellular Networks

UAVs are more prone to upstream and downstream blockage issues compared to ground user equipment (GUEs). This is primarily due to UAVs being within the line of sight of numerous base stations, most of which are down-tilted to cater to GUEs.

The telecommunications industry recognizes the importance of supporting low-altitude unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) to enable beyond line-of-sight (LOS) operations and establish reliable communication. This section summarizes the outcomes and current status of various industry-driven initiatives aimed at achieving these objectives.


### The phase of the 3GPP Study Item


In March 2017, the Third Generation Partnership Project (3GPP) established an inspection item (SI) with four primary objectives: understanding the requirements for UAV traffic, developing an air-to-ground channel model, ensuring the existing LTE framework supports UAVs, and identifying necessary changes leveraging LTE Version 14 features. The SI concluded in December 2017, outlining reasons for each area.

i) **3GPP Study Item:** UAV Mobility Requirements Defined communication types that cellular networks should support for UAVs operating between ground level and 300 meters.

ii) 3GPP Study Item: Channel Modeling Proposed a specific channel model to represent the interaction of cellular networks with both ground and aerial devices. This model supplemented options developed by the academic community, categorized into Air to Ground (A2G), Air to Air (A2A), and Ground to Air (G2A) within Tables III and IV. These models utilized various base station setups resulting from extensive estimation campaigns.

Upon evaluating congestion and channel descriptions, the associated organizations discovered that UAVs are more prone to upstream and downstream blockage issues compared to

ground user equipment (GUEs). This is primarily due to UAVs being within the line of sight of numerous base stations, most of which are down-tilted to cater to GUEs.

### Aerial Base Stations: Challenges and Opportunities

The reduced costs and increased complexity of purchasing UAVs, coupled with downsized base station hardware, have opened opportunities to deploy base stations on flying UAVs. This innovative approach presents challenges in positioning and mobility but offers significant improvements in coverage, load balancing, and user experience compared to traditional ground-based setups. However, practical issues such as position optimization and power consumption for UAVs remain significant challenges.

### Position Optimization for Aerial Base Stations

Determining the optimal position for aerial base stations is more complex than for terrestrial base stations due to varying heights. Several studies approached this issue, with some focusing on 3D arrangements and others on 2D positioning, affecting factors like throughput and interference. Different

methodologies were employed, including genetic algorithms and iterative problem-solving approaches.

### **Conclusion**

The integration of UAVs into cellular networks presents both challenges and opportunities, as identified in industry-driven initiatives and academic research. While 4G systems can address several concerns, the evolving landscape toward 5G and its successors shows promise in handling UAV-related issues more efficiently. The groundwork and interest in this field are expanding, with increasing efforts in regulation and technological innovation to address security, cost models, and future directions for UAV-assisted cell communication. This area of research is still in its early stages, indicating a promising path for exploration and growth in the years to come.




Figure 2. Public safety applications of unmanned aerial vehicles

# The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

# What the CFO of the future must be prepared for

any years ago, I watched the 1962 Hollywood Western blockbuster starring Clint Eastwood, Lee Van Cleef and Eli Wallach. The story chronicles their escapades, as they overcome multiple threats, in the backdrop of the American Civil War in search of a cache of gold. Tomorrow's CFO is in the same situation – the future is VUCA (Volatile, Uncertain, Complex & Ambiguous), the challenges are many and the CFO needs to use every ounce of talent, wit and ingenuity in search of the proverbial "pot of gold" or shareholder value.

The Good

If you google "latest trends in business finance", the top response is anything and everything related to technology. Whether it is AI, Blockchain, Digital Transformation, Data analytics or Cybersecurity – technology is pushing the boundaries of possibility. Over the last few years, technology has unleashed the power to revolutionise business finance. What used to take ages and scores of people, now takes a tap

of a button to accomplish.

One big benefit of technology is that most businesses – public or private, big or small – have leveraged the power of Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP). Cloud computing and SAAS technology have ensured that business decision-makers across organizational size and geography have access to standardised processes and procedures. The consequent financial and operational information is consistent and of a high auality.

The combination of technology and improved processes has changed the talent landscape. Routine repetitive data no longer requires clerical talent – technology has taken care of that. Financial talent has moved up the grid to analysis and decision support resulting in complex algorithmic decision models and higher quality data analysis and predictive decision making.

### The Bad

Technology is great and gives the CFO a plethora of choices. Some technologies are in the nascent phase while others have demonstrated capabilities. The CFO's challenge is to be able to identify the right technology that aligns with his business goals and strategy and then establish the business justification to transform the business. This requires the CFO to invest time and energy to learn about the different technologies, discover the relative benefits and costs and then decipher the appropriate technology that will add value to the business. The challenge is compounded by the changing business landscape and whether or not the technologies will be able to stand the test of time.

The transformation from legacy systems to a technology-driven process-oriented business requires change management. Unless

the entire organization participates in the change initiative, buys into the process changes and owns and contributes to transformation, the costs of transformation increase astronomically.

Furthermore, technology transformation requires a significant investment of money and resources into talent development at every level as technology is all-pervading. Most organizations invest in directly associated skills that correspond to the technological transformation. This has proven to be sub-optimal. Investment in leadership and agility is equally critical.

### The Ugly

The most difficult part of technology transformation is that while on the one hand, it delivers increased benefits in terms of cost savings and increased efficiency, it requires robust security systems and frameworks to keep the data safe. We live in a world where data is the new oil. The recent hacking of very large corporations that rendered them immobilised for a few

days is a case in example.

Technology-based processes require CFOs to ensure that the process flows that are internal to the technology are properly

documented to ensure they are verifiable and auditable. Opaque processes due to technology inhibit the ability of external auditors to provide a fair opinion on the business results.

Probably, the greatest challenge the CFO faces is, on one hand, the war for talent and the other is to invest in talent development continually. With technology changing very fast and in a situation where the Gen Z workforce seeks meaning and purpose in their jobs, there is a constant need to

upgrade and develop talent across the organization, especially in the Finance team to keep themselves abreast of the latest best practices. The CFO must also constantly inspire the team and others within the organization to rise above the normal and learn new skills.

### The CFO of the Future

The CFO of the future must be a combination of tech-savvy like Satya Nadella (Microsoft CEO), inquisitive, curious and outcome-focused like Sherlock Holmes (Detective par excellence) and a leader like Marshall Goldsmith (Executive Coach) while still retaining the mantle of being the quardian of the assets!


